

Photographer Saucier creates beautiful sleeping-baby portraits

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Tanis Saucier started taking photographs as a professional **stock** photographer seven years ago. She took photos of food, landscapes, everyday household objects and self-portraits. This is how she **honed** her craft. However, after she became a mom, she turned her eye exclusively to baby **land**. "I have two children aged four and seven. As soon as I saw my first baby, he stole my heart and inspired a new passion in me – to photograph babies who have just entered the world."

All the photographs she takes happen within a baby's first ten days. She explains the significance of this time frame. "During this period, the baby appears flawless, astonishingly beautiful in so many ways. The baby is still curled in a semi **womb**-like position, looking pure and at peace. I use my magic baby-whispering techniques to get them to sleep." "Sleeping babies are so calm and each has a unique innocence that I capture for eternity."

However, Tanis's childhood was not without photo turmoil. The last of seven girls, she noticed from a very young age there were no photos of her – except for one, taken at the age of three. Clearly, she felt *left out*. "By the time I came along, mom was too busy to take pictures of me. Having six other daughters *to tend to*, time slipped away, and with it, my baby face turned into a toddler's *sulk*." She became passionate about the fact that few parents have time to take professional pictures of their newborns. They are so busy showing the baby off, buying stuff and trying to get some sleep themselves, that the camera often takes a back seat. *Founding* her own company, called Tanis Saucier Photography, she says that like a baby, it's been growing non-stop.



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Starting out as a **shoot-and-burn** photographer, she's really pleased to offer a full-service studio. "I go to the family's house to show the results, and help them select frames and even offer interior design advice as to where to hang the photos." What makes this talented and dedicated brilliant baby photographer rather exceptional herself is a simple yet powerful belief that speed and instant product result are not the way to go. "The **digital** age has replaced the hands-on **tactile** experience of enjoying portraits [that] you can hang or **gaze** endlessly at in a real album." No need to go to your computer or shove in a CD. "For me, technology is a tool to assist you in some details in the final creation, but it shouldn't be utilized as the mode to show it. I don't want anyone to rely on the digital way of the world to admire their beloved baby." Simply put, the irresistible softness of a baby is totally contrary to hardware.

Admitting there's self-interest in *specializing* in new-born portraiture, Tanis reveals her motive. "I'm done having my babies. I am 44, so this is a lovely way for me to continue to connect in a joyful way with babies and those who have brought them into the world." There are smiles all round. Even those sleeping babies look like they're holding happy secrets.


